## Algebraic properties of sets:

- $\overline{\mathrm{U}}=\varnothing$
- $A \cup(B \cap C)=(A \cup B) \cap(A \cup C)$
- $\overline{\mathrm{A} \cup \mathrm{B}}=\overline{\mathrm{A}} \cap \overline{\mathrm{B}}$
- $A \cup A=A$
- $A \cap B=\bar{A} \cup \bar{B}$
- $A \cap A=A$
- $A \cup U=U$
- $\overline{\overline{\mathrm{A}}})=\mathrm{A}$
- $A \cap U=A$
- $\bar{A} \cup A=U$
- $\mathrm{A} \cup \varnothing=\mathrm{A}$ or $\mathrm{A} \cup\}=\mathrm{A}$

Addition principle of cardinality:

- $|A \cup B \cup C|=|A|+|B|+|C|-|A \cap B|-|A \cap C|-|B \cap C|+|A \cap B \cap C|$


## Properties of characteristic functions:

- $\quad f_{\mathrm{A} \cap \mathrm{B}}=f_{\mathrm{A}} f_{\mathrm{B}}$; that is $f_{\mathrm{A} \cap \mathrm{B}}(\mathrm{x})=f_{\mathrm{A}}(\mathrm{x}) f_{\mathrm{B}}(\mathrm{x})$ for all x .
- $f_{A \cup B}=f_{A}+f_{\mathrm{B}}-f_{\mathrm{A}} f_{\mathrm{B}}$; that is $f_{\mathrm{A} \cup \mathrm{B}}(\mathrm{x})=f_{\mathrm{A}}(\mathrm{x})+f_{\mathrm{B}}(\mathrm{x})-f_{\mathrm{A}}(\mathrm{x}) f_{\mathrm{B}}(\mathrm{x})$ for all x .
- $f_{\mathrm{A} \oplus \mathrm{B}}=f_{\mathrm{A}}+f_{\mathrm{B}}-2 f_{\mathrm{A}} f_{\mathrm{B}}$; that is $f_{\mathrm{A} \oplus \mathrm{B}}(\mathrm{x})=f_{\mathrm{A}}(\mathrm{x})+f_{\mathrm{B}}(\mathrm{x})-2 f_{\mathrm{A}}(\mathrm{x}) f_{\mathrm{B}}(\mathrm{x})$ for all x.


## Properties of integers:

- If $n$ and $m$ are integers and $n>0$, we can write $m=q n+r$ for integers $q$ and $r$ with $0 \leq r<n$.
- Properties of divisibility:

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If a | b and a | c, then a | (b+c) If a | b or a | c, then a | bc
If a | b and a | c, where b>c, then a | (b-c) If a | b and b | c, then a | c
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- Every positive integer $\mathrm{n}>1$ can be written uniquely as $\mathrm{n}=p_{1}{ }^{\mathrm{k} 1} p_{2}{ }^{\mathrm{k} 2} p_{3}{ }^{\mathrm{k} 3} p_{4}{ }^{\mathrm{k} 4} \ldots \mathrm{ps}^{\mathrm{ks}}$ where $p_{1}<p_{2}<$ $p_{3}<p_{4}<\ldots<p_{\text {s }}$ are distinct primes that divide $n$ and the k's are positive integers giving the number of times each prime occurs as a factor of $n$.
